Dissemination of Results

The Committee will forward its report to the criminal justice faculty by the end of each academic year. A final version of the report will be submitted to the Chair for inclusion in the department's annual report, which is forwarded to the Dean and Provost.

Incorporation into Planning Process

The Assessment Committee will examine the assessment results each year as well as at the end of the 5-year cycle with an eye to: (1) improve and enhance student learning and growth at program and course level, and (2) to evaluate the assessment process itself for its comprehensiveness and efficacy/ usefulness of the existing assessment results. The Committee will specifically examine gaps in the learning goals, modification/addition to learning objectives, curriculum revision, instructional delivery changes, changes in course sequencing, or increased emphasis on skill development. The Assessment Committee will work closely with the Curriculum Committee on recommendations and implementation of those recommendations.
